

The guided tour was led by Mrs. Heni Meke the National Director for Anglicare PNG Inc. the delegation from UN-AIDS were interested in the capacity in which Anglicare was performing in terms of service delivery and the assistance provided from within the country and external sources such as Donor Aid. A Most Significat Change story through the eyes of a friend

Anglicare Popondetta's, comprehensive Mobile Intervention Programme and on-site service (Please note that the following article was written with the consent of the individual)

The purpose of this most significant change story is to capture the impact of the type of services Anglicare is providing in the community through the comprehensive Mobile Intervention Programme and on-site service provision by Anglicare Popondetta.

This is a Story about one of our female client who survived the stigma and discrimination from the community and even self hate, for 14 years, living with the trauma.

MSC Story

I was first detected HIV positive in 1999, 9 months after my husband died in the hospital, I was the 3rd wife with two other, who were there before me, the three of us served one husband and we all lived in one house. And because of my deci-

sion to marry this man, my family suspended me from the family line, I always regret and blame myself on the decision I made. I came home after 2 years to die in my home and thinking that my family would forgive me and accept me, however my situation was worse than ever, when I came home, and when my family learnt, that I was infected by the man I got married to. Things got very worse for me, I was so troubled, no friends, no family, everyone in the community started gossiping about me I had no freedom no place to go, I was lost. In the mist of all my pain and confusions, at that time, Anglicare came to my community, they brought one of the dead bodies to my village, and through the gossip I learnt that this was a body of a PLHIV, one of my own kind, I was very surprised to

know that HIV was already in my community, and I was trying to work out where could Anglicare fit in, because I've never heard of Anglicare before, I said to myself, I must somehow talk to these people and find out, there were only 2 male staffs who took the dead body home. So I sent my only small brother who was always good to me with a note instructed him to give it to one of the staff. The moment I saw one of the Anglicare staff who came to see me in my home it was just like seeing a light at the end of the tunnel, hopes for living, and he even spoke kind words to me, that was the first kind words I ever heard since I came home. During the conversation, I learnt that, this was a counsellor I was talking to, he gave me lot of options on the positive living, and one other things, he told me was if I could try not to meditate up on my past, forgive myself and that I should accept the fact about my status and look ahead to the future. What he said was very true, I never wanted to accept my status and I always blamed myself all my life for the decision I made. He even told me about the services the Anglicare is providing especially the HBC. I was very interested and asked how I could access that services. He told me that, that services was for everybody and that I was also in that services. I don't know how to thank Anglicare, without Anglicare I would have died long time ago, Anglicare has become my family and my hopes for life

He added that WASH was important in the everyday living of any community but most importantly was the community service. "WASH is important, but the work comes from the heart of the community" he said. Steele added with praise the commitment of the community and their leaders for the project and by showing up to meet the Australian delegation. The key essence in a project as such is maintaining a good relationship with each other he said. According to Anglicare PNG Inc. Director Ms. Heni Meke the onus was now upon the community to take care of the facilities provided.

al, USA and representative of CDC. Dr. Fabian after having a glance at the DATA Base which Anglicare managed was impressed with the information. "There is so much information, it is unbelievable and you have the advantage to use for Anglicare purposes and also can be utilized by the NDoH at a National level", he said. Ms. Josepha Tametalong. The National Director welcomed the positive comments from the delegation representatives relating to the DATA Base and said that Anglicare would be looking at improving the capacity of the staff to manage the DATA even better. Dr. Fabian and Dr. Bruce gave positive comments on the DATA Base and shared their views on the importance of having backups inclusive of keeping both manual and electronic copies of records. Their other and main concern was the

16th and the Last Graduation - 280 Graduate throughout 8 years

Perseverance and determination takes any woman or man to their destiny and this was clearly shown on the faces of the graduating learners of the Anglicare POM Adult Literacy School. National Director for Anglicare Mrs. Heni Meke congratulated the hard work put in by the learners and their teachers to come this far. She also announced that the graduation was the 16th through the eight (8) years of the programs existence and the last for the school as the the programs donor under the Strongim Pipol Strongim Nesen Project had accomplised the two years according to the signed agreement two years ago. "We have to make hards decisions and we shall see how we can manage the program to keep it running" she said. The Director

"For this year (2014) we have 100 learners graduate and in total for the school, 280 have

moved on so far. The school has over the years grown in capacity staff and students and this is an encouraging improvement for the level of Literate citizens of Papua New Guinea. He said Adult Literacy is here to stay and we are focussed with our targets to educate more people, young and old.

Anglicare PNG Inc. Adult Literacy Centre here in Port Moresby received a courtesy visit by officials from the AFL PNG Niu Kick Program recently.

The visit was organized

by the Branch Manager for the Anglicare Port Moresby Branch Office Mr. Bernard Paru. Paru told the Adult Literacy students that the visit was to enlighten the students on the sporting code of AFL and how they could benefit from it. The Niu Kick program staffs were led by the Junior Development Program Manager for Southern Region Mr Cornelius Papau. Papua and his technical staff were on hand and delivered their session in two parts beginning with the theoretical aspects of AFL and a brief history of the sport here in Papua New Guinea and ending with a practical session of ball handling and kicking skills. According to Papau AFL PNG Junior Development has been in existence for the past 12 years. "I am proud to say that AFL was the first sporting code in PNG to start the Junior Development Program before any other sporting code here

in the country" Papau emphasised. He said the Niu Kick Program was an initiative of AFL PNG to assist school students both in their sporting and social aspects of being a student. He added that that his staff went to schools and promoted AFL but also taught students how to live a healthy lifestyle avoiding anti-social behaviours like engaging in alcohol and drug abuse. Mr. Papau encouraged the adult literacy learners that they too could take part in the program by bringing in their school aged children to register in the Niu Kick program. A day workshop was organized by the Water Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) Program team for senior and any interested staff of Anglicare PNG Inc. The workshop was facilitated by a representative from WaterAid PNG. The participants were introduced to the facilitation of people with Special Needs (People with Disabilities). They went through an interesting session of building a miniature sanitation facility for people with disabilities. The participants were given information vital to help in assiting people with special needs. Anglicare POM Branch manager on behalf of the organization and the participants thanked WaterAid PNG for the support in this capacity building exercise for workstaff of Anglicare. Anglicare PNG Inc. had taken onboard the WASH Program in late September 2013.

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Anglicare Hagen improves quality in Counselling

- 1.Introduction to HIV Counselling
- 2. Voluntary Counselling and Confidential Testing

Due to very big number STI/HIV patients managed and registered at Mt. Hagen Provincial Hospital's STI/HIV clinic, Anglicare Mt Hagen branch's VCCT site was identified as Tininga Clinic's satellite site in 2013 when it was accredited by National Department of Health (NDoH). In preparation, Anglicare management recruited five Community Health Workers the same year. One of which was seconded to Kundiawa Urban clinic to help Ante Natal mothers. These people were employed, without any counselling or VCCT/PICT experience even though their work required them to do counselling. The branch's

attempts to recruit people with these skills were not successful as most of the qualified people were already doing some work with other organisations. After the recruitment, the health care workers were given in-house training on Introduction to HIV Counselling. The weeklong training was conducted by Anglicare staff (Pr. Allan Kuma) who is a NHATU certified trainer. The training enabled the employees to do basic counselling. After assessing Anglicare's HCT program and manpower needs, the management

had been multiskilling staff so that they perform multi-tasks. During an outreach HCT activity, a number of staffs travel with the team but not all are able to do VCCT. Many clients who come for VCCT are turned back as a result.

Anglicare Newtown's VCCT clinic is also experiencing an increase in the number of clients under the MARPs category. Two partners namely, BUPNG and Tingim-Laip's outreach workers/ Peer Educators had been referring more than 15 clients weekly to the

clinic on average. Sometimes, there are fewer counsellors to counsel clients when a team is sent out to do mobile clinics. The management sees a need to train its program and admin staffs who are knowledgeable about the activities Anglicare conducts. These staff had been participating in advocacy sessions with the MARPs popu-The two trainlation. ings are proposed for the health care workers and other Anglicare staff. BUPNG has nominated its program officer for MARPs program who will join Anglicare staff in Introduction to HIV Counselling training and Voluntary Counselling and Confidential Testing. Susu Mama, who is working with ante natal mothers in Mt. Hagen has nominated two health care workers to be trained on VCCT.

Anglicare Lae has new staff to increase its service capacity to the public
